# From your President - Hello all!

This is my first report as President of the Unitarian Fellowship of Fredericton Board of Directors. I'd hoped to provide one for the August Touchstone, but I was too busy traveling and working to get it done. One of the things I'd like to do is keep you informed about what your Board is up to these days.

I chaired my first meeting on August 9th, and a steep learning curve it was, too. The Board team is supportive and exceedingly helpful: Joan Brewer as Past President; John van Abbema as Vice President - Programs and Ministry; Tom Hanley as Vice President - Finance and Facilities; Gail Moore as Vice President and Betty Lou Daye as Associate Vice President - Communications and Outreach; and allison calvern as Secretary-Treasurer, who adds a touch of humour to our minutes (and, as she says, with loads of help from George DeMille). George DeMille is keeping great track of our finances and keeping us up-to-date at each meeting.

The meetings get underway with a lighting of the chalice with a few relevant words, similar to our Sunday Services. We agree on an agenda and then have a check-in to see where everyone is 'at' before launching into business.

At the August meeting we discussed things that had come up at the last Board Meeting (in June) and the Annual General Meeting (also in June), including the parking plan - signs and procedures for renters; the process for Primary Social Focus, which we deferred as Agenda item for future Board meeting as Tom Hanley wasn't able to be there; the

submission of new Lay Chaplain nominee (Tony Fitzgerald) to the Canadian Unitarian Council (CUC); and a request to the West Bequest Fund.

The Fellowship is fortunate indeed to have people who generously give of their time. We value the contribution of the Committee leaders, such as Sylvia Hale, who is setting up the Sunday Services; Rhonda Connell and Jeff Frooman for the Religious Education (RE) program for children; Anne Leslie on Caring with Haifa Miller, Sharon van Abbema and Margaret Fitzgerald; Sheila Moore with Gail Moore on Lay Chaplaincy; Tom Hanley on Social Responsibility; Ken Moore on Buildings and Grounds; and Glenna Hanley on Membership and Public Awareness. We are also grateful to all those who contribute to make these Committees work, and to those without whom we would have no music, yard sales, craft fairs and conferences.

We also have Sharon von Abbema as our Lay Chaplain, and Tony Fitzgerald who's in training. Tony continues to ensure you're kept up-to-date through the Touchstone as our Newsletter/Webmaster – contributions welcome!

The Hospitality Committee is still looking for someone to help lead it, as Betty Lou has 'paid her dues' for two years. So, if you are good at organizing and can help the Hospitality Committee, it would be great as the tea, coffee and calories are integral to our Sundays! On another note, if you would like to lead a Sunday Service, please contact Sylvia Hale (506 457-1146).

What else do we talk about? Well, Food Bank donations, for example, and important things like ensuring our building and grounds are safe and well maintained. Ken Moore offered a number of suggestions which the Board discussed, including:

- improving the signage for the Fellowship (no-one notices the current sign by the road)
- waterproofing the chimney and repairing the water damaged ceiling in the children's room
- exploring ways to reduce congestion between the kitchen and the vestibule
- keeping our trees healthy and trimmed.

We also discussed about planting memorial trees on the Fellowship grounds, and the Board really liked the idea. We'll develop a protocol for this.

If you need access to the Fellowship building, the <u>door code</u> has been changed, so you can contact **Ken Moore** (506 363-2480) for the code. The Membership Directory is being updated, so if you want to make changes, please let **Glenna Hanley** know (506 472-8431). George DeMille can send you a copy if you don't have one.

We'd like to have a <u>wheelchair</u> on hand for the Fellowship, so if anyone knows of one that could be donated, would you please tell someone on the Board.

#### How do we work with these ideals?


