Sustainable living speaker

author visiting us April 25



"When one practices global living, each of our daily actions improves the health of the whole locally and globally. The ecological, social, political, and spiritual systems at all levels are then able to regenerate and flourish."

I think most of us will agree that living an environmentally sustainable lifestyle is highly desirable, and, some would say, essential to preserve our planet. But how to do it? Where to begin?

The quote above is from the book Radical Simplicity: Small Footprints in a Finite Earth. The author, Jim Merkel, is coming to our area.

Mark your calendars for Wednesday, April 25. Tom Hanley, chair of social responsibility, with the aid of David Brown (aka Margaret's son), has arranged for Merkel to visit the Unitarian Fellowship on that date. A pot luck supper will be held, along with an opportunity to interact with Mr. Merkel.

If you wonder how much Merkel knows about the topic of sustainability here are the titles of some projects he ran at Dartmouth College (in Hanover, New Hampshire): Sustainable Dining, Solar Thermal Evaluation; Carbon Reduction, Sustainable Offices, Green Greeks and Solid Waste Reduction.

If that is not enough to convince you here is more about Jim.

He is director of the Global Living Project and consults with municipalities and university campuses to explore sustainable practices. GLP also operates a summer institute where participants attempt to live equitably with as small an ecological footprint as possible.

Merkel, who now lives in Belfast, Maine, founded the Alternative Transportation task force in San Luis Obispo, California, researched sustainability in Kerala, India, built a permaculture home and demonstration site, and started a Cycling for a Sustainable Future speaking tour that has logged over 17,000 miles and delivered hundreds of workshops on sustainable living.

This event is not open to the general public but you can bring along a friend or neighbour interested in this topic.

You are also asked to bring along a dish to share. Coffee and tea will be provided by the fellowship.

Exploring PT Ministry Options

To Members and Friends of the Fredericton Unitarian Fellowship

At the annual financial meeting in January, members of the Fellowship approved the setting up of an ad-hoc committee to look into the feasibility of engaging a part-time minister. Joan Brewer spearheaded this initiative and has now been joined in this committee by Sheila Moore, George DeMille and John van Abbema.

We met Wednesday March 7, 2012, and quickly realized that it would be a more complex task than we had imagined earlier. Several questions came up:

- 1. What are the expectations of our members and friends?
- .a Do we only want only a regular minister one Sunday a month?
- .b Do we also expect someone to provide pastoral care and counseling as well?
- .c Do we expect someone to provide and organize workshops, programs, small group discussions, etc.?
- 2. Where do we resource a part-time minister?
- .a Locally, through our informal network in Atlantic Canada and the New England States?
- .b From a resource of retired ministers from other faiths?
- .c Formally, through the Canadian Unitarian Council or the Unitarian Universalist Association?
- 3. What resources are available to us to make this a reality?
- .a Would we as individual members be willing to donate extra funds for this purpose?
- b Are there financial programs available from the CUC or the UUA to help us pay for a part-time minister?
- .c Is there a combination of (a) & (b) that we should be exploring?

The committee members feel strongly that a part-time minister could be a great benefit to our small fellowship. However, we need to explore this initiative wisely and include our members and friends in the process.

To that end, Joan will be our liaison with the Canadian Unitarian Council to explore the administrative avenues available to us. Sheila will organize small focus groups within our Fellowship to determine our expectations. George has the history of previous involvement with the UUA and CUC to give us guidance in this matter. John van Abbema will keep you informed of our progress as we look more deeply into this matter.

Thank you for taking the time to consider this initiative. We look forward to your input and guidance in this matter. The committee will meet again on March 28 to consolidate its findings and to determine the next step forward.
